## A Message From Ron Becker

Dear friends, as I write this message for the *Schrier*, we are preparing for a very active fall season at the JCC. But first, a recap of a very active month of October 2019 corresponding to Tishrei 5780.

Our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services were well attended and hopefully provided a good spiritual experience and the framework upon which to build throughout the new year. In between our observing the High Holy Days on Shabbat Shuva, we were honored to hold the adult B'nai Mitzvot of four beloved congregants Ana Calderon, Barbara D. Johnson, Barbara E. Johnson, and Art Simon. In front of a full sanctuary, they expertly chanted the special Haftorah for that Shabbat including the words of three prophets Hosea, Micah, and Joel, and shared a beautiful Kiddush luncheon for all who attended. It was deeply meaningful experience for me and the entire congregation and exciting to meet generations of their families.

On the Sunday between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (October 6<sup>th</sup>), we gathered to remember those who came before us and helped shape our lives. We chanted memorial prayers at three cemeteries, Beit Olam in Trinity, Grace Memorial in Hudson, and the national military cemetery in Bushnell at 2:30 pm. Then we further remember our loved ones at the Yizkor service on the afternoon of Yom Kippur and on the morning of Shemini Atzeret.

On the Shabbat between Yom Kippur and Sukkot, we celebrated a milestone birthday of beloved congregant Gary Brevoort with many family members and friends attending and enjoying the Kiddush luncheon that followed.

We decorated our JCC Sukkah (thanks to the volunteers!) and held services outdoors in the Sukkah on the first night of Sukkot. We held services on the holidays of Hoshana Rabba and Shemini Atzeret, and then on Simchat Torah, we enjoyed our annual "ice cream social" and then celebrated with song and dance, the completion of the reading of the Torah and immediately began anew with the book of Genesis, a year older and presumably wiser and with more life's experiences to further our understanding of the Torah.

We continued to reach out to other communities of faith as we seek to obliterate the hate and violence that has ravaged much of the world. On October 24<sup>th</sup>, we participated in an interfaith service to combat anti-Semitism at St. Theresa Church in Spring Hill, FL. I spoke at this deeply moving gathering, along with spiritual leaders from other synagogues, churches, and the Islamic community. Our member Jill Pfluke played the violin beautifully with appropriate melodies throughout the event.

Although the High Holy Days and festivals are now behind us and we are in the month of Cheshvan (the only month without holidays), we continue to build upon the momentum gathered earlier. We start off the month with our first community Shabbat dinner of the season on Friday, November 8<sup>th</sup>. As it is Veteran's Day weekend, we will honor all of our veterans. Please sign up for the dinner and service that precedes it at 6:30 pm. All veterans are encouraged to attend and if willing, to relate anything they wish to share about their military experience. One of the most moving moments for me during the High Holy Days, was the visit to the national military cemetery at Bushnell and chant memorial prayers for relatives of our congregants.

On Sunday, November 24<sup>th</sup> at 1 pm, I will be delivering the D'var Torah with the theme of why Thanksgiving is important to the Jewish faith. Then along with Professor Catherine Eskin from Florida Southern College, I will be speaking on the history of the central/west Florida Jewish community. I will focus on Pasco/Pinellas Counties while Professor Eskin covers Lakeland and Polk County.
